Vigil Honor Nominations Due at March LEC

It is not too early to start thinking about Vigil Honor nominations! The Vigil Honor is the highest honor that the Order of the Arrow can bestow upon its members for service to lodge, council, and Scouting. Membership cannot be won by a person's conscious endeavors.

The Vigil Honor is a high mark of distinction and recognition reserved for those Arrowmen who, by reason of exceptional service, personal effort, and unselfish interest, have made distinguished contributions beyond the immediate responsibilities of their position of office to one or more of the following:

- Lodge
- Order of the Arrow
- Scouting community
- Scout Camp

Under **NO** circumstances should tenure in Scouting or the Order of the Arrow be considered as reason enough for a Vigil Honor recommendation.

Any member of the Order of the Arrow registered in Scouting and in good standing in a regularly chartered lodge is eligible for recommendation to the National Order of the Arrow Committee for elevation to the Vigil Honor provided that, at the time of the recommendation, the individual has been a Brotherhood member for a **minimum of two years**. OA Educational Performance Team Fulfills Scouting's Mission

Members of the Wundchenneu Chapter Order of the Arrow Educational Performance Team are shown with Camp Riley youth in the amphitheater at Bradford Woods on July 10. Campers are examining and trying various items used by Delaware Indians and other Native Americans including a flute, drum, bow, arrow, and various furs. During the summer, the team worked with youth who have physical disabilities, Down's syndrome, and craniofacial anomalies.

Most Scouters know that the Order of the Arrow is Scouting's National Honor Society that emulates the Lenni Lenape or Delaware Indians. But, many may not be aware of the council's Wundchenneu Chapter Educational Performance Team. Formed in 2003, the purpose of the chapter is to educate children about the rich culture and traditions of the Delaware Indians through their history, legends, language, music and dance. The Team also teaches and promotes Boy Scout values and skills, including outdoor experiences, to children who may not have the opportunity to participate in them.

The Team is aided by an active 14-member Advisory Board including three Native Americans (two Delaware; one a former chief), and officials from Conner Prairie, Eiteljorg Museum of American Indians and Western Art, Riley Children's Foundation, and WFYI Teleplex.

Youth members of the Team have learned Delaware Indian stories, regalia, drumming and dance so they can teach other children. The lessons were originally taught by Michael Pace and Jim Willaert (Vigil Honor) of Conner Prairie's Lenape Village, while being video-taped then edited into a six-hour training series by WFYI that can be used for years to come. With the assistance of advisory board and lodge member Pat Irwin, authentic Delaware-styled regalia were created for the Team members to wear during their performances.

The Team's primary performances have taken place at Camp Riley, the Riley Children's Foundation camp for

Indiana children with physical disabilities held in Bradford Woods near Martinsville. Starting in 2004, the Team has visited Camp Riley during the summer to perform for Campers and counselors. The performances include: a Delaware greeting, explanation of the Team's mission, differences explained between Delaware (Woodland Indian) and Plains Indian ("Hollywood") regalia, Delaware stories, explanation and playing of Native American flutes, a bow and arrow explanation, and demonstration and interactive drumming and dancing. This past summer, 12 performances were held during five visits at Camp Riley, much to the delight of more than 200 campers. One of the most popular stories is "How the Turtle Cracked It's Shell." After hearing the story, Camp Staffer Diana Helt said, "The boys talked about how they wanted to go on a nature hike and find turtle shells. One camper also decided that he is going to make a story book talking about the Indians and the things that he learned from the Scouts' presentation. They loved it!"

Not only is the Wundchenneu Chapter Order of the Arrow Educational Performance Team beneficial to those that observe the performances, it also is worthwhile for the Scouts and leaders involved. Members acquire public speaking skills and are interactive with youth with challenges that include physical disabilities, Down Syndrome, and craniofacial anomalies. Thanks to the Team for their service to the community and for spreading the great news of Scouting through its Delaware Indian performances.

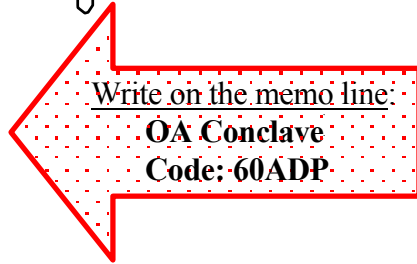

Philmont Trail Crew



The Order of the Arrow Trail Crew program is one of the best ways to experience Scouting's premier high adventure base, Philmont Scout Ranch. For two weeks, participants see and experience all that Philmont has to offer and much more.

For the first week, participants have the chance to make a significant difference to Philmont by participating in trail building in the backcountry. Work will include clearing terrain for trail and constructing switchbacks, retention bars, and several other erosion controls. The impact of this service will be felt by scouts for decades.

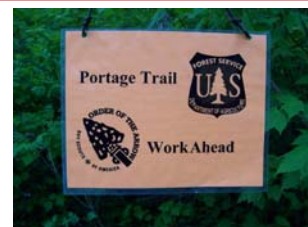
The second week of the program is spent experiencing Philmont in its finest. Unlike regular treks, Trail Crews make their own itinerary, instead of selecting from pre-planned routes. You can do and see just about anything, from the Tooth of Time to Baldy Mountain, your crew decides!

Wilderness Voyage



The Order of the Arrow Wilderness Voyage program is an experience like no other. For two weeks, you will join together with Arrowmen from around the country and experience all that the Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness in northern Minnesota has to offer.

The first week of the program is spent giving back to the Boundary Waters through portage trail restoration work. Participants have the opportunity to leave their mark on the Boundary Waters that will enable millions of visitors each year to better enjoy their experience. Trail work involves restoring and protecting trails that have existed for centuries and are in dire need or repair.

The second part of the program is a trek planned by the crew. From the 8-1/2 mile "Grand Portage" leading to Lake Superior, to the Height of Land, even the pictographs on Fishdance Lake, crews have done and seen all in the Boundary Waters.



OAOA

The Order of the Arrow Ocean Adventure is a unique opportunity to experience the programs at the Florida Sea Base, while providing a new type of service to the Atlantic Ocean. In a two-week period, participants will complete PADI SCUBA certification, as well as interact with undersea wildlife like no other Scouts do.

For one week, participants will undergo intensive SCUBA certification in preparation. Arrowmen will also provide meaningful service to the staff of the Florida Sea Base, and enjoy fun in the Florida sun while brushing up on their volleyball skills.

The second week of OAOA is spent using the SCUBA certification to its fullest extent. Participants will spend their time taking wildlife samples in the Florida Keys, performing island restoration and other meaningful projects to the surrounding area.

ARROWCORPS5

A HIGHER ADVENTURE

The Order of the Arrow has had a long-standing interest in coordinating a national service project, utilizing the infrastructure and leadership established over many years of success at the Boy Scouts of America's high adventure bases. Working closely together, the United States Forest Service and the OA have chosen five project sites, spread across America that will be the focus of our combined efforts. ArrowCorps5 (pronounced Arrow Corps Five) will provide a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for each participant to set an example of leadership in service to those who treasure our national forests.

Five thousand physically fit and able volunteers (determined by the "Philmont Weight Limits for Backpacking & Hiking"), made up of youth and adults, will participate. The national Order of the Arrow committee and key sponsors will fund the projects. Participants will pay a reasonable fee to help pay for accommodations, meals, and a full day of recreational activities during the projects.

Additional information will be available through the National Bulletin and National Order of the Arrow Web Site in the future. Mark Twain National Forest will be the first of the five sites to be featured starting in the fourth quarter of 2006 with the other four sites following in 2007.
